Police and Crime Commissioners

Directly elected by the public to be their voice in policing and hold the police to account

- Hold the police budget, set spending plans and agree priorities with the Chief Constable
- Bring together community safety and criminal justice partners, to make sure local priorities are joined up
- Use their local mandate as representatives of the community to press Government for change
- The Association of Police and Crime Commissioners is a effective influencing body for policing and communities

What we have been doing

- For the first time, the Association of Police and Crime Commissioners has convened a national Portfolio Group that has road safety as a key focus
- Action plan in place focusing on placing PCCs more centrally in national road safety policy development, promote the sharing of best practice and using their role in commissioning victims services to those impacted by road traffic collisions
- Engaging with the Policing and Fire Minister senior police leaders at meeting with Road Safety Minister to build a stronger evidence bas to inform national policy





Road safety is a cause for national concern

In 2017, the societal cost of road traffic crashes was £35 billion


- An average of 73 people were killed or seriously injured on Britain's roads every day
- 60% of fatal casualties occurred on rural roads
- On average, single carriageway 'A' roads have eight times the risk of motorways



Better understanding the problem

Innovative work taken forward by the Office for Data Analytics funded by Police and Crime Commissioners

- Building a comprehensive picture of road risk, including collisions, near miss and speeding events by working with partners
- Opportunities for all areas and all partners to benefit from this work

More investment is needed in enforcement

Fines from road traffic offences should be invested directly into local road safety
